



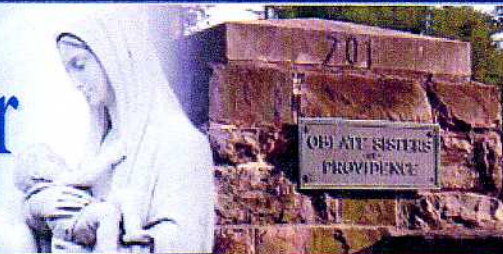

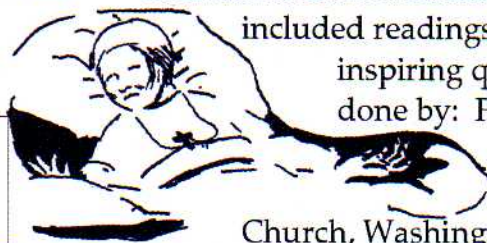


MOTHER LANGE DAY

When Mother Mary lay dying in great pain early in the morning of February 3, 1882, she refused medication so as not to break her fast. She wanted to receive her Jesus in Holy Communion. In the chapel below, Mass was being celebrated and a young novice was pronouncing her first vows: "I promise," she prayed, "poverty, chastity, and obedience according to the constitutions of the Oblate Sisters of Providence. And I ask the help of St. Frances of Rome, St. Joseph, St. Benedict and all our blessed patrons. Amen." Upstairs, Fr. Anwander began administering the sacrament of anointing. As he touched Mother Mary's hands, he stopped and gave her the last blessing. Mother Mary died as she had lived, with hands outstretched in love and service (Lannon, p.20).

Thursday, February 3, 2005, the 123rd anniversary of Mother Mary Lange's death was

commemorated at the Oblate motherhouse. More than 100 people braved early snow showers and uncertain weather to attend the commemorative interfaith service. The event

included readings and reflections on inspiring quotes of Mother Lange done by: Father Donald Fest, SSJ, pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church, Washington, D.C. and MML Board member; Father Jack Podsiadlo, SJ, St. Ignatius, Baltimore and MML Board member; Pastor William Sewell, Interfaith Academy Church; Sister Marina Kelly, OSP, Mount Providence and MML Board member; Esther Sanders, OSP Associate Program and MML Board member. Father Donald Sterling, pastor of The New All Saints Church, Baltimore, gave the keynote address and said, "Mother Lange spoke with conviction, predicated on faith and trust in God and love for her brothers and sisters."

DOCUMENTS IN TRANSIT



At last the documents attesting to the life of heroic virtue and deeds of the Servant of God, Mary Lange, have been sent to Rome for review and decision. If accepted, the title of Venerable will be given to this candidate for sainthood. The cause of Mother Lange, considered an "ancient" cause by the Church (Mary Lange died in 1882), requires investigation of information obliterated (or diminished) by time, physical relocation, language and a dearth of correspondence and public records. Now the cause moves to the

next phase: investigating favors (especially physical healings) received. Recipients of a healing received through the intercession of Mother Mary should be mindful of two questions Rome will ask: 1) Did you pray to anyone else? 2) To whom else did you pray for the same healing? Then, if healed only through Mother Lange's intercession, are you willing to so testify, and produce medical records attesting to the nature of one's recovery? Documents of healing will be sent from Mother Lange Office to the proper officials to determine authenticity.
